BETWEEN US ...

If I try to imagine the sheer magnitude, not to mention the variety and complexity, of the ways humans interact and communicate via technology, I am quickly dumbfounded. For some “virtual worlds” that take more time and energy than the physical world. My kids tell me about “My Space”- an interactive web site where they communicate with their friends. You go on a date, I’m told, and then head home to learn about your date via information and pictures about them posted by themselves and their friends. That’s not really new – we’ve all depended upon a wider community to get to know people – but it’s incredibly fast. What used to take a month or more now takes an hour. Another site I’ve just heard of is called “Second World” – on online virtual world in which people engage, via internet, in many of the activities which shape the human community – dialogue and disagreement, buying and selling property, work, hobbies, gain and loss, and much more. (The thing that piques my interest in this site is the news that there is only one church in this virtual world, and it is a UU church...)



I’m intrigued by, and a little wary of, imaginary realities and virtual worlds. But perhaps they are really nothing new, and probably they play an important role in our lives. Haven’t humans always had worlds of imagination and imagery? So much of religion depends upon imagination – the stories, myths, rituals and liturgies people have engaged in for millennia require imagination and the sharing of images. In the “modern” world we often dismiss the so-called “imaginary” as simplistic or juvenile. But most of our advances in science and technology have depended first upon the active imaginations of scientists and visionaries. Advances in justice have also often happened because some people are courageous enough and articulate enough to describe a new reality which is detailed in their imagination. In the life of both mind and heart imagination is essential. How else can we understand at all that others who are not ourselves are nonetheless human, like us?

Perhaps the difference in our modern imaginary worlds is our reliance on electricity and batteries – former generations depended only on their human capacities of feeling, imagining, speaking, acting. (A quick aside: religious communities sometimes depended upon drugs to enhance their imaginations. A recent quote from Harpers Magazine noted “Researchers found that excessive use of computers and other technological devices can cause people to suffer a loss of I.Q. more than twice that observed in marijuana users.”)

It is true that people can confuse imagination with reality – sometimes dangerously. This does not happen only among religious people. And what distinguishes “good” imagination from “bad” is certainly debatable. But for me the question of role of the imagination in our lives is very important – much more important than the question of, for example, whether or not the resurrection of Jesus is literal or figurative. In our imaginations, we work on the questions of life and death. So, although I am wary of “virtual worlds,” I am interested enough to find out more, because I think they may simply be the latest variety of an age-old human need. What do you think?

Speaker Series – Eileen Wilson-Oyelaran

On **April 16**, Dr. Eileen Wilson-Oyelaran, President of Kalamazoo College, will be speaking at People's Church. She is the first female president, as well as the first African-American president of the school.



A native of Los Angeles, Dr. Wilson-Oyelaran earned her B.A. in sociology from Pomona College, and an M.A. and Ph.D. in education from Claremont Graduate University. She also received the Thomas J. Watson Traveling Fellowship, which enabled her to execute independent research in

Ghana, Nigeria, and Tanzania. After completing her doctoral work in early childhood development, she accepted her first academic position at the University of Ife (now Obafemi Awolowo University) in Nigeria.

Dr. Wilson-Oyelaran's scholarly focus is in child development and education in cross-cultural context, and she has published widely in this area. While in Nigeria she served as a consultant for UNICEF (Nigeria) and designed surveys that became the model for assessing the status of children under five. She has also held many other academic positions including Vice President of Salem Academy and College.

April 8 "Iran in the Spotlight"

Erika Loeffler Friedle

The troubling political happenings in this old and famous Middle Eastern country are of interest and concern to us all. Anthropologist Erika Friedle, Emerita Professor of Anthropology, WMU, who has been studying the culture and lifeways of the people of Iran for more than 40 years, will talk about the effects of the recent socio-economic developments in the Islamic Republic on the lives and aspirations of the people there. She was in Iran again for three months less than a year ago and is able to provide insights based on personal experiences in the country.

April 15 "Does Breast Feeding Really Benefit Children?" **Martin Zelder/Laura Hans**

Although it is widely proclaimed that breast feeding leads to better developmental outcomes for children, this recommendation is potentially dubious, as women who choose to breast feed may well differ substantially from women who do not. As a result, the differences in child outcomes such as IQ may be entirely or mostly attributable to maternal characteristics rather than breast feeding. Martin Zelder, an economist, and Laura Hans, a pediatrician, will discuss the design of their research project that seeks to resolve this puzzle.

NEWS AND NOTICES

Highlights of March Board Meeting

The Treasurer's Report for the period ending February 28, 2007 showed expenditures are about 8% below budget, so income exceeds expenditures by about \$17,000 for year to date. The March 4 special collection yielded \$1051, one-half of which will go to our partner church and one-half to Loaves & Fishes. The initial draft of the 2007-08 church budget includes the proposal of two new approximately quarter-time positions: RE Assistant and Membership Coordinator.

Potential leaders for the Forum are being sought due to the Zelders' retirement. Other activities for the 10-11 am Sunday timeslot are also being considered.

Updated Letters of Agreement for the Administrator, RE Director, and the Music Director were adopted.

Delegates appointed to attend the Heartland UU District annual meeting were: Dale Abbott, River Artz-Iffland, Connie Ferguson, Kelly Henderson and Hillary Lake, with Diana Artz-Iffland as an alternate. Subsidies were approved for those requesting them. McAllister, Melvin, Mienk and French also will attend in their professional capacities.

A proposed policy and procedures for weather-related church closings was discussed. Input about this issue is welcomed.

The initial meeting of the Long Range Planning Committee occurred in March. Two task forces were established; one to look at programming options and the other to assess facilities options.

The ad-hoc Land Purchase Committee has been evaluating information and is communicating with the owner of the property to the south of the church and with his realtor about property specifications and pricing. The current owner approached People's Church with an offer to sell.

Surveys asking for suggestions and preferences regarding a Mission Statement headline will be

distributed during the Canvass Sunday service on March 25.

The UUA Stewardship Grant Proposal project has been dropped based on the lack of clarity about the church's benefit from this program.

The many new adult programming options available were discussed: 20-30-somethings group, Cakes for the Queen of Heaven, Pranayama Breathing, Crones, Parenting, One-on-One Connector program.

Committee chairs are reminded that their annual reports are due to Chris Schleuder by May 6.

As always, members and friends are encouraged to discuss any of these topics with Board members.

An Offer for Us to Buy Land

The owner of 9.45 acres of undeveloped wooded land to the south of us has asked if we would be interested in purchasing it. The offering price is \$120,000. We may be able to purchase the land for less money. The land is zoned R-2 for single family or duplexes. A subcommittee of the board is examining the proposal. Initial thoughts are that the land closest to the church would be valuable for:

- An aesthetic buffer
- Future expansion to the south

Future expansion to the north is difficult due to the Memorial Garden, and because the church septic field is to the north.

The next steps to be taken are:

1. Arrange an independent appraisal of the land
2. Use an architect or developer to help get a realistic idea about what options the land would allow us for future building and what potential there would be to sell some of the land after carving out a buffer for the church.
3. Assess our ability to purchase the land.

The executive committee of the board believes that we should not deplete our limited reserves or go heavily into debt to make the purchase. Instead, it has been suggested that some church members might

be interested in forming an investment partnership to acquire the land for the church.

Therefore, this is an invitation to all who might be interested and willing to form a partnership to make an offer for the land. The intent would be to deed some of the land to the church; the partnership would hold an unspecified portion of the land until it could be sold and the partnership dissolved. Any profit or loss would be absorbed by the partnership. The church would have first right of refusal to purchase the land. The partnership would owe yearly taxes on the land. At this point I do not have an estimate of the investment risk or potential, or the investment time line.

If you are potentially interested in being involved in the process, please e-mail Bob Davis or Jill McAllister with your intent, and the amount you would potentially be willing to invest. Input about the appraisal and land evaluation process (e.g. who to work with) would also be helpful.

Here is a "Whitman's Sampler" of workshops being held on April 21:

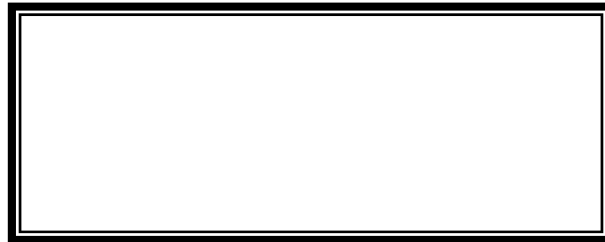

2. Paula Cole Jones, a consultant for JUUST Change, a UUA "anti-racist, anti-oppression transformational program" for UU congregations started in 2005, will present at a workshop. The UU Church of Flint is working with JUUST Change.
3. Maryellen Lewis, Global Chair of the Global Fair Banking Initiative and Chair of Michigan's National Community Reinvestment Coalition, will lead a workshop on "Building Legislative Advocacy Skills".
4. UU history teacher, Jon Hart, will share insights from visiting with Central American coffee growers as part of his presentation on how to do justice in

your congregation by participating in a Fair Trade Coffee program.

5. Hear how Michigan UU congregations work for justice from: Kate Warner, First UU Congregation in Ann Arbor; Bill Dodson, Community UUs of Brighton; and Jon Hart, UU Church of East Liberty.
 6. Learn strategies for addressing poverty issues by attending a workshop led by Peter Ruark, a UU staff with the Michigan League for Human Services and Rev. Kimi Riegel, Co-Chairs of the MUUSJN Poverty Task Force.
 7. Peace in the Middle East will be the focus of a workshop moderated by Matt Hoerauf, Executive Director of the Cranbrook Peace Foundation. Speakers include Emmy Lou Cholak, a Traverse City UU peace activist, and one or more activists who are native to the Middle East.
 8. This will be an opportunity to discuss what your congregation is doing (or would like to do) to implement the Green Sanctuary Project. Dan Kossuth from Birmingham Unitarian Church and representatives of First UU Congregation of Ann Arbor will tell what they are doing to make this Project work.
 9. Keynote: Ms. Dizzy Warren, Executive Director of the National Resource Center for Healing of Racism, will help us begin to understand how to communicate about racism.
 10. You can hear Rev. William F. Schulz, former UUA Director and former Director of Amnesty International, speak that evening at an Interfaith Peacekeepers Convocation in Jackson on "Human Rights and the Quest for Peace" and next morning on "After Ecstasy, the Laundry" at the UU Church of East Liberty. - There are other pleasant surprises waiting for those who attend the "Larger Voice for Justice" conference. We hope to see several people from your congregation attend this year's MUUSJN conference and bring back justice information and actions to your religious community.
